To: Pastoral Letter to West Ohio United Methodists

RE: Payday Lending

Grace and peace to you from God our Creator and the Lord Jesus Christ.

I recently participated in a press conference with other religious leaders to speak out against excessive payday lending interest rates and in favor of the new law passed by the Ohio General Assembly limiting the interest rates payday lending institutions can charge Ohio citizens. My press conference statement, which also addresses the issue of casino gambling, can be found at www.westohioumc.org/yeson5. I request that pastors and church lay leaders make this letter and information about the press conference statement available to their respective



congregations.

For years, payday lenders operating in Ohio have been permitted to charge 391 percent annual interest. This has added to the growing debt problem of many Ohio citizens. These lenders prey on some of our most vulnerable populations, including low-income families, the elderly, minorities, military personnel and others desperate for cash. This is morally wrong and inconsistent with our historic United Methodist prohibition against the “giving or taking of usury” (General Rules of The United Methodist Church).

Payday loan customers are often faced with an impossible decision – pay for an over-priced product or not have an important need met. Members of the Ohio General Assembly and Governor Ted Strickland banded together to give customers a new choice – payday loans with an interest rate that cannot exceed 28 percent.

Rather than operate under this new law, payday lenders are attempting to overturn it. The lenders are calling their campaign “Ohioans for Financial Freedom” and have spent millions of dollars to place their cause on the November ballot as State Issue 5.

Usury is not freedom. It is exploitation. It is financial bondage.

Today’s payday lending practices are not just financially irresponsible; they are morally reprehensible. It is imperative that persons of faith who seek the common good for all of God’s people work together to preserve the new payday lending reform law and stop those who charge 391 percent interest, just as Jesus once chased the moneychangers out of the temple (Mark 11:15-17 and Matthew 21:12-13).

I respectfully encourage you to witness to your neighbors, families and friends regarding this issue and to vote “yes” on ballot Issue 5.

Sowing the Seeds of Christian Love in Southeast Kentucky



The SOWER VIM project has been a part of constructing 9 homes for families in the Henderson Settlement service area and is now in the planning phase for house number 10 in 2009. The approximate cost of materials to build one of these houses from the ground up is approximately \$36,000. The SOWER VIM Project needs to have at least the majority of the \$36,000 in materials costs covered by pledges of support before late January 2009 to be able to commitment to building this next house. The SOWER VIM Leadership Team is requesting that the churches of West Ohio prayerfully consider supporting this worthwhile project financially with a pledge of support prior to the January '09 decision time. Those that have served on SOWER work teams understand how much the volunteers get out of the experience as well as the level of need in the Henderson Settlement service area. As an example of the need, the last available data put the average annual income for a family of four in Bell County, KY at ~\$22,000. The average income in the Henderson Settlement Service area of southwestern Bell County is well below this figure. West Ohio Conference churches are invited to participate in this rewarding project with your prayers, your volunteer labor, and your financial support.

SOWER is a West Ohio Conference VIM project in conjunction with Henderson Settlement, Frakes, Kentucky, which is a component of the Red Bird Missionary Conference. The SOWER project is run in conjunction with Henderson Settlement's Work Camp Program to enhance the lives of the people of Southeast Kentucky by improving their housing situation. The Work Camp Program has traditionally repaired existing housing to raise the quality of life for the owner families but a number of years ago it was realized that new housing was also needed. This decision was reached because 1) in some cases the existing housing had deteriorated to the point that replacement would be more cost effective than repair, 2) the family had lost their home, or 3) lived in substandard rental housing which could not be worked on.

Work weeks for the house construction have been put on the Henderson Settlement schedule in May, July, and August of 2009. The Build Schedule, Frequently asked Questions about Henderson Settlement/The SOWER VIM Project, and a registration/donation form are included in the following pages of this document.

YOUTH GROUP PROPOSALS



My name is Joe Edinger and I work with the Millersburg United Methodist Youth. Our church is located in the Three Rivers Conference in Holmes County, OH. Our youth group consists of about 40 youth and we typically have 15 - 20 in attendance each Sunday. Our Youth Group is composed of students in grades 6 - 12 but our faithful attendees are typically the younger youth. We are working on that and pushing for a firm commitment from our youth for this week. In the past we have been successful for out of town projects. It is the local ones that they work hard to find excuses for!

Over the last 5 years we have annually attended the Group Workcamp Missions in a variety of states. This year we would like to try something new and hope to recruit other youth groups to join us in our project. Depending on how God wants to develop this project, we will eventually have a plan for the last week of June. If this project is successful we can allow it to grow over the years.

Our Proposal(s): Youth Group Exchange -

1. - We are willing to come to your town and assist you with a project in your town. We can do simple construction (have built lots of porches on trailers), winterize, paint, work Bible Schools, sports camps, yard work, and other similar projects. We can basically sleep about anywhere (like to be in one place as a group) and we can provide our own tools, adult chaperones, and transportation.
2. - Then we would like to have your group come to our town and help us with projects. We have a large common's area at church (AC) with showers and a kitchen OR we have a nice cabin with a pond in the woods in the middle of just about nowhere!
3. - The thought is that we would provide the materials for the work when youth come to our town and you would provide the materials needed for the work in your town. The home youth group would verify that the site is safe, a Christian environment, and that a plan is in place to finish any projects if they are not able to be done by the youth.
4. - Meals would be provided by the home youth group. In other words, we take care of everything when you come here and you take care of everything when we go there. Saturday, June 20th - Youth Group A Travels and arrives are destination for evening. Sunday, June 21st - Worship together and commission the work for the week

Meet your team and visit the worksites

Mission project in the community (pass out water, carry bags, wash car windows and etc. at Wal-Mart or Grocery Store) - Accept NO payments but can offer a card or flyer from home church.

Monday, June 22nd - Wednesday, June 24th - Complete projects, evening fellowship and recreation. Travel to Group B destination afternoon/evening. Visit your new worksites if time allows.

Thursday, June 25th - Saturday, June 27th - Complete projects, evening fellowship and recreation.

Sunday, June 28th - Worship together at Group B's church then depart for home.

Plan B - Holmes County Mission Trip

Sunday, June 21st - Travel to Holmes County and check-in between 2 and 3

Orientation and Group orientation

Meet your team and visit the worksites

Monday, June 22nd - Friday, June 26th - Complete projects, evening fellowship and recreation.

No work on Wednesday afternoon and evening - Visit the Mohican State Park for Canoes, Go Karts, Trails, and Swimming

Friday evening - Mission projects in Community

Saturday, June 27th - Travel home after breakfast

With no exchange we will split costs for entertainment, materials and recreation. We do have some grant sources available here to offset materials.
